If you're a young Indigenous person and have a business idea or want to start a business, apply for LaKles Wayhut: Business Start-Up for Indigenous Youth.

This full-time 12-week program lays a foundation for entrepreneurial experience and success. Participants will gain knowledge about core business practices and the broader enterprise environment through a combination of instruction and practice delivered by highly-qualified teachers, mentoring by Indigenous entrepreneurs and community leaders, the incubation of small business ideas, and the opportunity to apply and extend their knowledge and skill through relevant, meaningful work placement. Following the program, participants will be able to leverage that knowledge and skill as they pursue their own business development, contribute to existing ventures, or move into further educational opportunities in support of their goals.

- 15 to 29 years old;
- a Canadian citizen/permanent resident;
